

The month of September saw many historical military events.

Oct. 8

1918, Cpl. Alvin York assaults a German MG position, earning him the Congressional Medal of Honor.

Oct. 11

1899, Second Boer War begins in South Africa.

Oct. 13

1775, United States Navy is created.

Oct. 14

1066, Norman Conquest of England begins, as William the Conqueror is victorious at the Battle of Hastings.

Oct. 16

1853, Crimean War begins as the Turkish Ottoman Empire declares war on Russia.

Oct. 19

1781, The British Army under General Cornwallis surrenders to General George Washington and the Americans at Yorktown.

Oct. 20

1944, General Douglass MacArthur steps foot on Philipine soil fulfilling his promise, "I shall return."

Oct. 21

1805, The British Royal Navy secures a major victory against the French and Spanish fleets at Trafalgar. Admiral Horatio Nelson is fatally wounded during the battle.

Oct. 23

1942, British General Bernard Montgomery launches an assault against German forces lead by General Rommel in North Africa at El-Alamein.

Oct. 25

1854, During the Crimean War, the Charge of the Light Brigade occurred as British Cavalry attacks Russian artillery positions, inspiring the poem by Alfred Lord Tennyson.

CMH Triumphs in DBx Smack Down! Hayes, Scholtz and Santucci Lead in Tacticon DBA 3.0 Tournament

September witnessed some spectacular Front Range DBx play. Perhaps most breath-taking, the seasoned CMH DBx Team took on their equally formidable CSGA counterparts in the third annual CMH/CSGA DBx Challenge Smack Down. Six events played on 3 August, and the seventh on 8 September. Competition was particularly intense, as CSGA won the first Smack Down in 2011 and CMH the second in 2012. When the dust finally settled CMH had won again, accumulating 238 points to CSGA's 216. On 1 September the DBA 3.0 Tournament at Tacticon involved many of the same players, but with very different match ups and results.

Particulars for the Smack Down results are as follows: In the DBA 3.0 Book I match up, Greg Rold of CMH with Thracians won against Bernie Santucci of CSGA with Later Athenian Hoplites, 41 to 19. In the DBA 3.0 Book II match up, Matt Vigil of CMH with Eastern Late Imperial Romans won against Mike Garland of CSGA with Pyrrhics, 38 to 2. In the DBA 3.0 Book III match up, John Brown of CMH with Qaramita won against Rob Scholtz of CSGA with Early Russians, 37 to 3. In the DBA 3.0 Book IV match up, Terry Shockey of CMH with the Medieval Scandinavian Union won against Doug Mudd of CSGA with Italian Condotta, 38 to 22. In 400AP DBMM2, Dick Fickes of CSGA with Desert Blemmye and Nobades won against Pat Harvey of CMH with Early Byzantines, 28 to 22. In BBDBA 3.0, Art and Roy Hayes of CSGA with Marian Romans and a Numidian ally won against Matt Vigil and Greg Rold of CMH with Gauls and an Iberian ally 78 to 22. In BBDBN, Doug Rains of CSGA and Nate Forte (on pre-pardoned loan from CMH to CSGA) leading the French won against Dan Gurule and Doug Wildfong of CMH leading the Prussians at the Battle of Placenoit 60 to 40. Andy Oertig, President of CSGA and our gracious host, won high praise for his accommodations and victuals while acting as Quartermaster General. One can well imagine the ranting and the crowing that accompanied the tight 238 to 216 point CMH victory! Undaunted Doug Rains, the CSGA ImPotentate of DBx Affairs, noted that the overall score for three Smack Downs running totaled 667 to 663 – and ominously added that CMH had best not rest on its laurels!

Most of the same bad actors showed up for the DBA 3.0 Tournament at Tacticon on 1 September. When the results were in, Art Hayes channeling King Arthur (Sub-Roman British) led the filed with 24 points. Rob Scholtz with Early Russians came in second with 23 points, and Bernie Santucci with Early Imperial Romans third with 19 points. Other strong performances were fielded by John Brown with Medieval Germans, Roy Hayes with Burmese, Doug Mudd with Parthians, Doug Rains with Pueblo Indians, Greg Rold with Thracians, Terry Shockey with Classical Indians, Brent Sustaita with Feudal Spanish and Matt Vigil with Medieval Poles. Doug Rains won the infamous Pink Dice Award, and Doug Mudd the Braveheart award for incredible daring – not necessarily in the presence of wisdom. Doug Rains could not help but notice the dramatic reversal of fortunes those from the wrong side of Castle Rock experienced between the Smack Down and the Tacticon Tournament. Where, he lamented, had all of these winning performances been during the course of the Smack Down!

Our next DBx event will be a Rise of Rome DBMM2 medley at Veterans Wars on 10 November. The BBDBA 3.0 Tournament at Genghis Con in February will follow, with warm ups at the CMH monthly meetings in January and February. If you have questions, please contact John Brown at jsandmbbrown@msn.com.

Corporal Alvin C. York **Congressional Medal of Honor Winner**

Citation:

Rank and organization: Corporal, U.S. Army, Company G, 328th Infantry, 82d Division

Place and date: Near Chatel-Chehery, France, 8 October 1918

Entered service at: Pall Mall, Tenn.

G.O. No.: 59, W.D., 1919

Citation: After his platoon had suffered heavy casualties and 3 other noncommissioned officers had become casualties, Cpl. York assumed command. Fearlessly leading 7 men, he charged with great daring a machinegun nest, which was pouring deadly and incessant fire upon his platoon. In this heroic feat the machinegun nest was taken, together with 4 officers and 128 men and several guns.

After Action Report:

WW2 Naval Action at Savo Island

Scenario

The WWII naval battle of Savo Island was re-played by two teams of people. One team played the Japanese fleet and the other team an American naval task force. The order of battle played during the game resulted in a fairly even balance of power. Playing the game during simulated night conditions eliminated complexity by removing air power and supported Japanese target acquisition capabilities.

Objectives

Japanese fleet units were tasked with several objectives; interdiction of allied air fields, landing supplies & troops on Guadacanal, and eliminating enemy naval units.

The American fleet units were ordered to locate, close with, and destroy enemy ships; preventing logistical support for continued Japanese offensives.

Game Play

The concept of the game was briefed to the teams, the briefing took the better part of an hour mainly due to the lack of experience possessed by some of the participants.

The sequence of game play was concise and easy to follow for the opposing teams. As the tempo increased, questions arose on actions and consequences of a game ruling. The discussions enlightened the teams and set the stage for faster paced game play.

Tracking the results of battle damage on fleet units was accomplished on plastic sheets and using erasable markers. The teams were generally successful in recording the damage, but a clearer record of damage inflicted needs to be developed. Additionally, markers recording fires or target acquisition need to be closely tracked for each fleet unit. The relative combat power of the unit is materially affected by degradation of it's firepower, propulsion, & armor or its ability to acquire targets in degraded observation conditions.

As a member of the Japanese team, I believe we were not diligent in target acquisition, employment of all combat systems like torpedoes, and coordinated in movement toward our Guadacanal objective.

Conclusion

The game ended in a draw due to expiration of allotted time. Each team learned about the capabilities of the units assigned to them. The Japanese interdicted Henderson field, almost landed troops & supplies on the island, and significantly reduced American combat power. The Americans delayed landing operations, destroyed Japanese fleet units, and potentially delayed enough for Allied air-power to be deployed as daylight approached.

CMH maintains ties with numerous local, regional and national groups to help promote the hobby. CMH is governed by member-elected officers who serve on the Board of Directors (executive board).
