The Battle of Barrosa A Regimental Fire and Fury (adapted) Scenario

Having escaped capture at Seville in January 1810, the Spanish Cortes (or junta) was bottled up in Cadiz by Marshall Soult throughout 1810. Cadiz was protected by an isthmus and strong walls and was thus impregnable when garrisoned, which it was, especially so when a British and Portuguese force was detached from Wellington's command and brought into Cadiz by sea. The British division was commanded by Lieutenant General Sir Thomas Graham, who was nominally second-in-command to the Spanish General Manuel La Pena.

In January of 1811, Soult decided to relieve some of the pressure on Marshall Massena in Portugal by laying siege to Badajoz, so a portion of his troops in Andalusia were moved off to Estramadura, leaving only Marshall Victor's I Corps to invest Cadiz. Victor could not take Cadiz, but neither could he leave it without surrendering Andalusia to the troops besieged within its walls, a classic stalemate.

The Anglo-Spanish saw the situation as an opportunity to lift the siege of Cadiz and seized it. Moving by sea, a large force landed in the rear of Victor's besiegers, but due to La Pena's incompetence it marched into a trap laid by Victor. He used one division to block the road to Cadiz and set two divisions in ambush to waylay the Anglo-Spanish, who thought they were enveloping Victor from the rear while he was attacked by the Cadiz garrison sallying out from the city.

The sally, under Zayas, might have been effective except for La Pena's tardiness in joining the attack. Zayas was instead driven back into Cadiz. La Pena's route of march was now obvious, so Victor hid two of his divisions in the thick woods around the town of Chiclana and used the third to block the coast road to Cadiz. If the trap worked, the Allies would be caught on a narrow peninsula and flanked.


La Pena attacked the blocking force, and forced it across a creek, but rather than attempt to break up the siege works, he decided to march into Cadiz instead. His rear and flank would be exposed to Victor's ambush as he did so.

Graham, commanding the rear guard, saw the danger and insisted that a large hill, the Cerro del Puerco, be occupied to protect the army's rear. Leaving a small force holding the Cerro del Puerco, La Pena moved towards his objective and ordered Graham to follow with the rearguard. As La Pena's troops marched towards Cadiz, Victor sprung his trap and moved to take the hill. Graham disobeyed his orders, turned his rearguard around, and sent them to retake the hill.


One of Graham's brigades faced the French division on the hill, while the other brigade engaged the French division emerging from the woods to the north. Disciplined British fire and several feints from a few Spanish and KGL cavalry squadrons kept the French off balance, as they had difficulty forming in the thick woods. Seeing the fronts of their columns mauled one after another, the French eventually broke and retreated.

Graham's victory was complete. His troops, however, were too exhausted to pursue the retreating French, and La Pena preferred to rest on his laurels from his minor victory over the blocking force. Ultimately, La Pena re-entered Cadiz and Victor re-occupied his siegeworks. Recriminations were made against La Pena, who in turn blamed Graham for the failure of the campaign. La Pena was acquitted by a court-martial, but relieved of command, and Graham was reassigned to Wellington's command for political reasons.

The battle is a reasonable size to be recreated using my World of Fun Miniatures 18mm flats for our April club meeting. I'm adapting the Regimental Fire and Fury rules for this Napoleonic battle, using a scale of 1 inch equals 25 yards and 1 figure equals 10 men. There are commands for 2-3 players on each side.

Historic Location of the Month Prairie Grove, AR

The Battle of Prairie Grove was a battle in the American Civil War fought on December 7, 1862. The original Borden House was one of the central points of the Confederate line and was the scene of heavy casualties. The Borden House was burned the next day. Following the war, the Bordens returned to Prairie Grove and built a new house, almost an exact replica of the old one, on the original foundation. This is the structure that still stands in the park today.
