# Rome Unravels Tournament Conclusion

## Sassanids and Patrician Romans take lead

We played the third and final round of our customary Veterans Wars *L'Art de la Guerre* (ADLG) tournament at the CMH monthly meeting on January 11<sup>th</sup>. The theme was “Rome Unravels (395-476 A.D.)”. Roman armies of the period and enemies who fought them were eligible. Still in play we had Patrician Romans (List 88) led by Greg Rold, Late Imperial Roman Armies (List 87) led by Pat Harvey, Richard Kasten, Jim Raardon, and Les Stuart, and Sassanid Persians (List 109) led by John Brown. Greg Rold was in the lead after the first round with 10 points. John Brown followed with 9 points and Pat Harvey with 6.

Pat’s Harvey’s Late Imperial Roman army had a command of legionaries reinforced by integrated artillery, a command of heavy cavalry including cataphracts, and a balanced command including medium *auxilia*. Most line infantry had missile support. He faced Les Stuart’s Late Imperial Romans which fielded a heavy cavalry command that included two cataphracts, a command of six legionaries with three light infantry, and a command with four impetuous heavy swordsmen, two medium swordsmen, and two medium archers.

The battlefield was open in the center with a stream on one flank and some terrain on the front and rear edges. Pat’s heavy cavalry rushed to attack Les’s medium infantry, catching it in the open, while Pat refused his medium infantry on the other flank. His lightening blow inflicted heavy damage before the legionaries in the center made contact. Losses accumulated quickly on both sides but the initial advantage and turned flank Pat’s heavy cavalry gained proved irreversible, ultimately leading their opponents to break.

Richard Kasten’s Late Imperial Romans featured a command of legionaries with integrated artillery, a heavy cavalry command that included cataphracts, and a command of medium auxilia with field fortifications. Jim Raardon’s Late Imperial Romans faced him with a heavy cavalry command including Cataphracts, a command of legionaries with integrated artillery, and a command of medium swordsmen. The terrain was largely open.

Jim launched a fierce legionnaire on legionnaire attack in the center, which met with a stubborn defense. The two heavy cavalry commands collided as well. Damage markers proliferated on both sides, but Richard was able to squirt some light horse and camels into the rear of the opposing cavalry. Meanwhile luck favored Richard in the center, and he wore down the legionnaires opposing him there. After further fierce fighting, Jim broke.

John Brown's Sassanids deployed a command with five cataphracts and four horse archers, one with four armored horse archers, and one with heavy spearmen and medium bowmen. He faced Greg Rold's Patrician Romans with two commands (one impetuous and one not) with six heavy swordsmen each and mounted or foot *foederati* mixed in. Greg's third command consisted entirely of light cavalry. A large clump of trees dominated the center of the Sassanid deployment zone while a gully lay in the center of the Patrician rear. Rough terrain perched on both flanks, weighted to the Patrician side of the board.

The Patricians launched their light cavalry on an off-board flanking maneuver while deploying their impetuous heavy infantry to face the less formidable spear and bowmen on the Sassanid left flank. The Sassanids maneuvered armored and light horse archers to intercept the flank march, faced the infantry in the Patrician center with their cataphracts, and retreated their spear and bow to delay an uneven battle with the Patrician right. When time ran out the flank march had been wiped out, the cataphracts were positioning for a fierce charge supported by the bowmen, and the Sassanid spearmen had fled as far as they could go. They stopped and formed in front of their camp with woods on one flank and the board edge on the other. The Sassanids were ahead on points, but the battle remained undecided. Would the Sassanid cataphract charge or the Patrician barbarian assault be more decisive? Only a few more turns would have told.

When the dust settled, John Brown led with 13 points. Greg Rold followed with 12 points and Pat Harvey with 11. Points per game are awarded at 5 for breaking an opponent, 4 for having an advantage of 20% or more when time runs out, 3 for a tie wherein both players are within 20% of each other when time runs out, 2 for being at a disadvantage of 20% or more when time runs out, and 1 for being broken. The final scores show what a close and hard-fought tournament this turned out to be!

Our next CMH ADLG event will be at the February 8<sup>th</sup> meeting. This will be our now customary winter fantasy event, with the Ice Queen returning to threaten Santa Claus and the Pleistocene Amazons again mustering to defend him. 
